


Crimson Scholars

High School students entering NMSU with a 3.75 GPA (or high academic index) and college transfers with a 3.5 GPA are automatically enrolled as Crimson Scholars - members of the Honors College Dean's List. This designation automatically entitles students to take Honors courses, receive priority registration authorization, and get regular notices of special opportunities designed for academically strong students. Recognizing that not all strong academic students meet these traditional standards, students are also encouraged to petition the Dean for designation as a Crimson Scholar!

University Honors

The structure of this flexible 18-credit academic program is designed to coordinate with student requirements across all majors. The best Honors courses are discussion oriented, experientially focused, with close faculty interaction. Honors values enriched learning and not harder and faster work! Students also earn Honors credits with study abroad, directed research, independent projects and more. Starting with the Honors First Year Seminar and ending with the Honors Capstone, students will be engaged with active learning activities, building their resumes of experience and elevating their academic success beyond the Honors Distinction earned for their transcript.

Conroy Honors & Presidential Leader Scholars

These two highly competitive scholarship programs are designed to recruit a small cohort of new high school graduates ready to model core honors values. Whether featuring academic excellence or leadership development, these Honors students will be engaging with the full life of the university while developing their scholarly and leadership potentials. With both Honors coursework and hands-on experiences, these students will be challenged and supported to do more with their NMSU education! All Honors students can participate in the same activities but because the Honors Scholar Program members receive extra financial support, they are committing to doing more from the start! Hello! I am Dr. Anne Hubbell, Associate Dean of the Honors College, and frankly, I have the best job on campus. I help students to graduate with an Honors Certificate or Honors Distinction. In my office, we assist students in achieving this Distinction through Honors course options in General Education, Viewing a Wider World, and Contract Classes that align with their majors or minors.

You may be thinking, Honors classes are harder! I am happy to say that at NMSU we focus on

developing classes that are more enriched, transformative, and experiential than other classes on campus. They are also usually much smaller than other classes. You may take a course, for example, that has a field trip component and/or meaningful discussions about your life and how you are a citizen of the world, not just Las Cruces. Or you may take a class where you become involved in outreach or service here in New Mexico or other places in the country. We even have a study abroad class! Our classes and the faculty who teach them are the ones you will remember when you leave NMSU.

HONORS CREDIT OPTIONS

Most Honors course credits double-count with other university requirements and the program is flexible enough to coordinate with all majors and academic programs on campus. Honors courses are not designed to just be harder, faster, and more work. They are enriched opportunities to do more with your education both in and outside of the traditional classroom. - Dr. Judith Flores Carmona

Dr. Judith Flores Carmona ("Dr. JFC") works with the Honors Deans to advise on the curriculum and to recruit

students to the Honors Program.

Dr. Flores Carmona is a first-generation college student and McNair Scholar Alum who went on to earn her PhD and complete a Post-Doctoral Fellowship before joining the NMSU faculty with a joint appointment in both Honors and the College of Health Education and Social Transformation. Now a full professor and the lead editor for

an international journal, Dr. Flores Carmona continues to touch the lives of Honors students in the classroom with her Testimonios class (meeting a Viewing a Wider World requirement), supervision of Honors Capstone Projects, and mentoring McNair Scholars.

- Dr. Sabine Hirschauer

Dr. Sabine Hirschauer, from the Government Department, has been a campus leader advocating for justice, global perspectives,

and democracy in her work with students. A leader for NMSU's exceptional Model United Nations Program, Dr. Hirschauer has been named the M. Eugene Sundt Professor in the Conroy Honors College and will be leading a special Honors seminar this Spring on Democracy in the World with special guests and field trips. Student projects will include Zoom meetings with students in Germany and the

development of podcasts to share lessons outside the classroom. For an even more immersive experience, keep an eye out for Dr. Hirschauer's Faculty Led International Program to

Desirae Price in New Zealand's Major Cities

Desirae Price is a senior McNair Scholar majoring in Anthropology and Linguistics, with a minor in International Relations. She traveled to Christchurch, Auckland, and Wellington, New Zealand to research the linguistic landscape in these major cities. Desirae has already presented her initial findings and continues to analyze the data for future presentations. This experience was made possible by one of three Honors College International Research Scholarships this year. This scholarship is awarded

to undergraduate students annually by the Honors College to support research and help students bolster their applications for future academic fellowship opportunities.

McNair, an accomplished astronaut, physicist, NASA trailblazer in the world of higher education, this program empowers first-generation college students with financial need, to pursue advanced degrees; most notably, the highest level of education that can be attained - the doctoral degree.

Through rigorous academic preparation, mentorship, and research opportunities, the McNair Scholars Program equips students with the knowledge and experiences to reach new heights, supporting them as they transform their aspirations into achievements. accomplishments of NMSU's McNair Scholars include presenting research at national conferences in their field of study, having their research published in scholarly journals, receiving


prestigious Boren Award and the National Science Foundation's Graduate Research Fellowship.


The Center for Undergraduate Research and Creative Activity (CURCA) helps you find your path into faculty-mentored research and creative experiences.

Join us at CURCA events year-round! This spring, 250 students presented their work at our 30th annual Undergraduate Research and Creative Arts Symposium, where twenty presenters earned top awards for their talks, performances, and posters.

Other highlights of the year include a fall open house for faculty labs and studios, the student-curated Honors Art Exhibition, workshops and panels, a downtown undergraduate poetry reading, and open mic night. Our student-edited journal, *The Agora*,

disseminates top undergraduate research and artwork and also gives the board hands-on experience with peer-reviewed academic publishing.

CURCA's biweekly CrimsonOpps emails and website share upcoming opportunities to get involved in research and creative scholarship. We collaborate with many campus programs that provide professional and/or financial support for undergraduate researchers. All students can pursue independent research with the guidance of a faculty mentor through the Honors Capstone. The Honors First-Year Seminar introduces you to these opportunities and much more. Biomedical Researcher

Biology major Vanessa Loera's capstone is adding to our understanding of Glioblastoma, an aggressive brain cancer, and its prevalence and treatment in New Mexico communities. Vanessa's review of open access articles and data sets identified the highest rates of cases and deaths from brain cancer in eastern New Mexico, where access to hospitals and cancer centers is often limited. Vanessa plans to attend medical school and serve her community in New Mexico as an MD.

For her capstone project in English, Devynne served as founding editor-in-chief for *The Agora*, our online, interdisciplinary journal of undergraduate research and creative activity. Devynne's vision was to celebrate and uplift undergraduates' unique contributions to intellectual life on campus: "NMSU is full of immensely talented students each with something different to say, and I began *The Agora* to help amplify their voices and solidify their space in academia."
