






How do I cold email a potential research mentor?

You have a short list of faculty you would like to approach about mentoring your research. These may be faculty you have taken classes with, found on the department website, or heard good things about from other students, perhaps in a major club. Try introducing yourself after class or visiting their office hours, if these are posted in a syllabus or on their door. If face-to-face is not an option, it may be necessary to cold email your would-be mentor. Make sure that to describe what interests you in their research and any experiences that would qualify you for their team. Also make to attach a CV. <u>For advice on your academic CV</u>, <u>see this resource from Columbia</u>. The sample email below is adapted from resources at the UCLA Undergraduate Research Center.

SUBJECT LINE: Student Interested in Independent Research in your Laboratory

Dear Dr. Agatha Pete,

My name is Tim Aggie, and I am a second year NMSU undergraduate majoring in Microbiology. I write to ask whether you might be accepting students into your lab group this fall or spring.

As a microbiology major, I am interested in research that focuses on the genetics and molecular biology of microorganisms. Your work studying the molecular basis for bacterial communication, or quorum sensing, sounds very exciting. I am very interested to learn more about this topic and the techniques that your laboratory uses to study this mechanism as an undergraduate researcher.

I would greatly appreciate an opportunity to meet with you to discuss projects that I might be able to join. My schedule is currently open on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays after 1pm to meet with you and for lab hours.

I have attached my curriculum vitae for your review. Thank you for your time and consideration.

Checklist:

- Summarize your qualifications for the position
- Show that you have familiarized yourself with the work the research lab or group is conducting (check their web presence)
- Personalize each letter for the particular researcher. Do NOT send generic emails.
- Make sure your CV lists relevant experiences and qualifications, such as coursework
- Send from your NMSU email address for a professional introduction
