DEMYSTIFYING HONORS

What it means to be an Honors Student



CRIMSON SCHOLARS

High School students entering NMSU with a 3.75 GPA (or high academic index) and college transfer students entering with a 3.5 GPA automatically enrolled as Crimson Scholars. It is the equivalent of being on the Honors College Dean's List and entitles students to automatic eligibility to take Honors courses, receive priority registration authorization, and receive regular notices of special opportunities designed for academically strong students. Recognizing that not all strong academic students meet these traditional standards, students are also encouraged to petition the Dean for designation as a Crimson Scholar!

CONROY HONORS & PA LEADER SCHOLARSHIPS

These competitive scholarship programs are designed to identify and recruit a small cohort of top new high school graduates ready to model our core honors values. Whether featuring academic excellence or leadership development, these Honors students will be working, in and out of the classroom, to be fully engaged with the life of the university developing their unique potentials. With Honors coursework and hands-on experiences, these students will be challenged and supported to do more with their NMSU educations! All Honors students can participate in the same enrichment activities but, because the Honors Scholarship Program members receive extra financial support, they are committing to doing more from the start!

UNIVERSITY HONORS

University Honors is the academic program of the Honors College with designated courses and special credit-bearing opportunities that lead to designation as a University Honors Graduate. Most of the 18 credits required for University Honors Distinction are coordinated with the other work students do as part of their regular university curriculum. The structure of this program, beginning with the Honors First Year Seminar and ending with an Honors Capstone Project, is designed to provide enriched educational opportunities and not just harder and faster work! Students that begin with a single Honors class their first semester will almost certainly be able to complete their program before graduation. Consistent with our inclusive philosophy, no competitive application is required. All Crimson Scholars are eligible to enroll in Honors classes and to meet with the Honors guidance team to work out an Honors academic plan. The best Honors courses are discussion oriented, experientially focused, with close faculty interaction. Students also earn Honors credits with study abroad, directed research, independent projects and more - with a focus on high impact and hands-on learning!.

The experiential Sundt Seminar resumed in Spring 2024 under the leadership of Dr. Mark Waltermire. Students explored the languages of New Mexico, while exploring themes of power, shift and loss, sociocultural identity, and preservation, through in-class instruction and travel excursions. The Honors college sponsored the students' and Dr. Waltermire's travel and exploration of Sante Fe, Chamayó, Cochiti, Acoma, and Mescalero, NM. The course will be available again to students in Spring 2025.

Most Honors course credits double-count with other university requirements and the program is flexible enough to coordinate with all majors and academic programs on campus. Honors courses are not designed to just be harder, faster, and more work. They are enriched opportunities to do more with your education both in and outside of the traditional classroom. In Summer 2024, Dean Camarena took 14 students who were first-time overseas travelers to explore the meaning of global citizenship while visiting three of Europe's great world cities. The group started in London, then explored Amsterdam, and ended their trip in Berlin. Students learned to see themselves and their place in the world differently while developing stronger intercultural competence and confidence. Students reported that they will never see the world the same after this experience and they have also learned how to navigate successfully in another country.

HONORS SCHOLARS MAKING THEIR MARK



Center for Undergraduate Research and Creative Activity

Hello from Tracey Miller-Tomlinson! As a scholar of Shakespeare and Renaissance culture, I work to recover lost voices and works of literature from the past. As an Honors faculty fellow, I direct the Center for Undergraduate Research and Creative Activity, which helps undergraduate students find their own paths into mentored research and creative experiences. Each year, hundreds of students attend workshops and panels hosted by the Center, tour faculty labs and studios at our Research & Creativity Open House, and participate in the NMSU Undergraduate Research and Creative Arts Symposium, now in its 30th year. Students from across the university exhibit artwork in the peer-curated Honors Art Collective, which turns Conroy Honors Center into an art gallery, and poets read their work at a bilingual Poetry Reading in a courtyard. community The student-edited online journal, The publishes faculty-reviewed Agora, undergraduate research and artwork. All students can pursue independent research with the guidance of a faculty mentor through the Honors Capstone. The Honors First-Year Seminar introduces you to these opportunities and much more.



Vanessa Loera Biomedical Researcher

Biology major Vanessa Loera is adding to our understanding of Glioblastoma, an aggressive brain cancer, and its prevalence and treatment in New Mexico



communities. Working with faculty mentor Dr. Elba Serrano, she examined open access articles and data sets to research the common causes, treatments, and mortality rates of Glioblastomas in our region. Her review identified the highest rates of new cases and deaths from brain cancer in eastern New Mexico, where access to hospitals and cancer centers is often limited. After completing a neuroscience research internship, Vanessa will be applying to medical school.

Flora Saenz Animator and Visual Effects Artist

For her Honors Capstone project, creative media major Flora created



Dancing Borders, a multimedia compilation that weaves together a memoir of her journey as a rookie animator on a real feature film with two digital drawing series: "Folklor" and "Life at the Border." Dancing Borders illustrates how the life of a professional artist is intertwined with the culture and beauty of Mexico and inspired by the art and history of Juarez. Devynne worked with faculty mentors to build The Agora from an idea to an open access, faculty-reviewed publication on track to last for years to come. THE MCNAIR SCHOLARS PROGRAM

TAKING A STEP TOWARD YOUR FUTURE

THE EXPERIENCE

The McNair Scholars Program prepares students for graduate school and the PhD. By conducting a paid research project, McNair students learn more about their academic potentials through firsthand experience. Their work is guided and supported by an experienced Faculty Mentor who already has their PhD. Additionally, students in the program are enrolled in exclusive seminars for their Junior and Senior years that allow them to further explore their academic interests and prepare them step-by-step for competitive application to PhD programs. McNair Scholars also receive mentoring, assistance with their graduate school application materials, and graduate school advising. Students participate in workshops and other activities that enhance their research skills and further prepare them for earning their doctoral degree. They also learn about ways to fund their graduate education, showing them how to earn their PhD at the lowest possible cost. Finally, McNair Scholars earn an honors certificate when completing the program and can use these credits to graduate with University Honors. Later in the program, scholars travel across the country to present their research at one or more research conferences with other McNair students.

Karyme Gomez-Sanchez had already presented her NMSU research at the National Association of School Psychologists' 2024 annual conference but got to explore new research on addictions this past summer at the University of Arizona's Undergraduate Research Opportunity Consortium.







Haylee Viramontes took part in the ANCHOR Summer Undergraduate Research Fellowship program at the University of Connecticut, and is currently working with two professors on a project within the National Institute for Undersea Vehicle Technology.

STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

McNair Scholars have been working on their research projects and gaining professional experience visiting other university campuses to present their research. This last year, students visited and presented work at the University of New Mexico, Baylor University, the University of Maryland, the University of Washington, and more!

With McNair as their springboard, students are also being admitted to competitive scholar programs across the country gaining new research experiences and building their resume of academic accomplishment.

Saul Angel Hernandez

completed research this past summer with Dr. Susan Atlas at the Quantum Undergraduate Research Experience at the University of New Mexico's Center for High Technology Materials. Saul's work explored the molecular dynamics of Kinesins.





THE OPPORTUNITY

Director Marko Mohlenhoff states, "Many of our students qualify for McNair but don't know about the program because it has only been here at NMSU for a year and a half. There are so many talented first-generation underrepresented students at NMSU – from majors in the humanities, social sciences, and life and physical sciences – that would be eligible for this program, but they're either unaware of this opportunity, or don't see how talented and capable they are of getting a PhD. For those students – who are doing well in their classes, love learning, are intensely curious, and want to study beyond the bachelor's degree level – this is their program!"
